You can get a free flu shot until 30 June.


It is a bad flu season this year.

"You get out what you put in."




Jim has lent a hand in our Morwell group since early 2021.

"He puts his paws over his eyes. And I reckon that's beautiful but I'm biased.


"He hasn't got many faults besides barking at the other dogs but we are slowly getting that out of him.

A tale of two Trafalgar locals who share a love of volunteering





Trevor Campbell and Barbara Stoneman have a few things in common.

They are both long-term members of Headway Gippsland's social support groups, they have dedicated years to the same primary school in Trafalgar, and they like a cup of coffee at 11am.

Barbara was eight years old when she had a tumour in the part of the brain that controls coordination and balance.

It meant she had to relearn to walk, talk and write.

"Dad used to help me walk around the yard, like he would walk behind me and I would walk on my own," Barbara said. "There were no carers around then, there were no walkers ... anything like that to help people.

"It was difficult, but with the help and support of family, I got through it, I went to a normal school."

Trevor also has an acquired brain injury. He was involved in a car accident in the 1960s that left him with a fractured skull.

"I was in St Vincent's Hospital in Melbourne for weeks in a coma and when I came out of it, luckily, I was able to go back to the job I was in," he said.

His workplace, the Reserve Bank, was very supportive.



"I was told to have an hour's sleep after lunch so I was pretty lucky and my mates stuck by me," Trevor said.

"Often you hear about people who have an ABI losing their mates but luckily, I wasn't like that."

Barbara said Trevor's story was unlike common experiences of ABI, where friends say they will come visit, then don't.

Barbara and Trevor eventually crossed paths at a ceremony, where Barbara won an award for helping kids read.

She had volunteered at the primary school for 30 years, five days a week.

Trevor spent about 10 years volunteering at the same school mentoring kids.

"I had a kid every hour and invariably they were the naughty ones," he said.

"But we used to get outside and play, kick footballs, cricket, throw things."

"Or on rainy days we'd be inside and we'd do pyrography, wood burning."

Trevor was already involved with Headway Gippsland when they both met, so he introduced Barbara to the groups.

Still members today, they both describe the Warragul group as offering "companionship".

Even during COVID lockdowns, their coordinator Michelle Meggetto helped the group stay connected via Zoom.

"We were able to keep in touch and get the news from everyone, not that anyone was doing anything of course," Trevor said.

They have both served on the Headway Gippsland committee of management where Trevor was president for several years.
